

Hand Safety


When handling heavy, sharp, or rough materials, work gloves help protect hands from injuries.


Safety Training

Injuries caused by the unexpected release of hazardous energy are prevented by following established Lockout/Tagout procedures.








Safety Communications

To ensure safe operation of our pipeline systems, Pipeline Control Centers must be notified of all maintenance or repair work which may affect system operations.



Electrical Safety


Only trained and authorized employees may work on energized circuits.




Emergency Preparedness


Eye and Face Protection

Frequent fire drills make employees mindful of emergency evacuation routes and procedures.


